Message on the occasion of the 20th anniversary of the Network of Concerned Historians

Dear colleagues,

Today, 13 October 2015, is the 20th anniversary of the <u>Network of Concerned Historians</u> (NCH). But this is not a time for celebration. History is as much in danger as it has always been. Here are a few events that occurred after the <u>21st NCH *Annual Report*</u> was published online on 14 July 2015:

- * In Syria, archaeologist Khaled al-Asaad (1934–2015), director of antiquities in Palmyra for 40 years, was beheaded by Islamic State militants on 18 August 2015.
- * In India, historian and outspoken critic of idol worship **M. M. Kalburgi** (1938–2015) was shot dead by unidentified men at his residence in Dharwad, Karnataka, on 30 August 2015.
- * In Azerbaijan, Leyla and Arif Yunus, both historians and human rights defenders, were sentenced to 8.5 and 7 years' imprisonment respectively on politically motivated charges in Baku on 13 August 2015.
- * In China, Tibetan writer and history teacher <u>Dolma Kyab</u> was released in Lhasa on 8 October 2015 after completion of a 10.5 years' sentence on charges of endangering state security.
- * In Morocco, historian <u>Maâti Monjib</u> went on hunger strike on 6 October 2015 to protest against a long campaign of harassment, including an investigation for endangering state security. Sign the petition <u>here</u>.

And in 2013–2014, lamentably, four historians were assassinated: **Jirí Fiedler** (Czech Republic), **Bashar Awad Marouf** (Iraq), **Samuel Malpica Uribe** (Mexico), and **Bohdan Solchanyk** (Ukraine).
